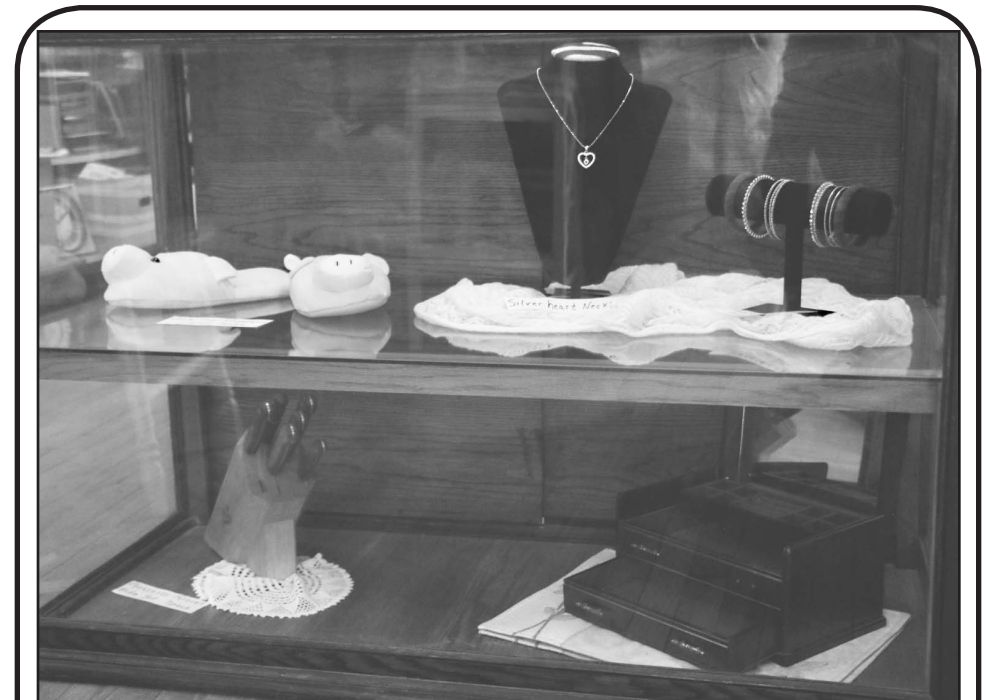

Bids can be made on any or all of these items until Friday, April 30, 2021, at 2:00 p.m.

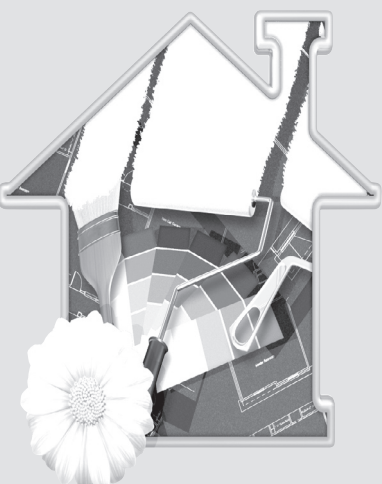
